ROOKIE GRAND NATIONAL PAIRS

This is an exciting new event for all players with less than 20 master points. The Calgary are qualifying rounds will be held at the Martinique on Monday, September 10th at 7:15 P.M., and Thursday, September 13th at 7:30 P.M.

One pair from each A.C.B.L. district will participate in a one-day, two-session playoff for the Rookie Grand National Championship in Cincinnati on November 17th. The trip award will include transportation, hotel and food allowances, and an Awards Brunch.

This is a fantastic opportunity for our newer members to taste the excitement of major competition, so line up a pertner and get in some practice games!

Important Notes: - In order to allow time for seeding the field and preparing the movement, this event will be by pre-registration only. Additional entries will be accepted only if they can be accommodated without disrupting seeding or movement.

- Awards will be in red points.
- The top 30% of the field will advance to the District playoffs, scheduled for January 12th and 13th in Great Falls.

CANADIAN NATIONAL TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP

This new event is the replacement for the popular Grand National Team event, but for Canadian residents only. Details are still sketchy, but it appears that competition will begin at the club level, with each club being eligible to host a game in the November-December time frame. NEWSMAKERS

The recently held North American Championships (Las Vegas, July 27th to August 5th) were of particular interest to us because they marked the first time a Calgary player participated in the National Playoffs of the Grand National Team championship. Unfortunately, Subhash Gupta and team-mates from Edmonton lost their quarter final match to a team from San Francisco, a team which eventually went on to finish second behind the aggregation from Chicago. Still, we're proud of you, Subhash, and one of these days you'll go all the way!

The Las Vegas NAC was the biggest tournament ever held, anywhere, with over 19,000 tables in play over 10 days. Many Calgarians did well, particularly <u>Subhash Gupta</u> and <u>Dale Hagen</u>, who (in different events and with out-of-unit partners) placed high in the over-alls in major pairs events.

Our unit was also well represented at the annual Lethbridge sectional, held for the first time in the sumptuous Lethbridge Lodge Hotel. The only locals to win an event were Charlie Roberts and Allan Simon, who combined with Terry Mickelson of Vancouver and George Roberts of Milk River to win the Swiss Teams, amid the applause of no one.

LARCENY IN LETHBRIDGE

Let me come out from behind the editorial "we" and tell you about a hand I played in Lethbridge.

In the second round of the Swiss, we are playing some elderly ladies I've never seen before, and things are going badly. We have doubled them in two cold games, then they get to a lay-down 7NT. On the last board, I pick up: S: K H: K D: AQx C: KQJ9xxxx. I open one club and partner responds one spade. I try three clubs, and partner echoes, three spades. Naturally, I bid four clubs and, predictably, he trots out four spades. Since we are behind in the match, I now try 4NT. Partner passes; West leads the queen of hearts and the following dummy hits the table: S: AQJxxx H: 10xx D: Jxx After some thought, East follows with the nine of hearts, and I win my stiff king. I survey dummy and my hand with a desperate look on my face, when suddenly the playing room is plunged into darkness. Power failure! But my drooling opponents urge me to play on. can't wait to compare scores. Suddenly, I have an inspiration. I lead the queen of clubs from hand. Small from West, ten from dummy, small diamond from East. Now, I table the king of spades. Ace of clubs from West: "No spades, partner?" asks East. West appears confused. The lights come back on. West finds a spade. I overtake in dummy, play the queen of spades. Now West really is void and must play her penalty card. Making seven. We won the match by one IMP.


Big Diamond Bridge Club

The September Problems

A.) Matchpoints, N-S vul., South holds: S: A1065 H: 62 D: Q95 C: Q1076

This was a tough problem. The preempt has ruled out any sensible investigation of a spade contract. This leaves three reasonable bids, ranging from the meek to the ferocious. The meek are first to speak:

STAN MATHESON: Pass. Hopefully for a plus, and, hopefully again, spades will break badly.

The middle-of-the-roaders are in the majority. This is not surprising; obviously anything could be right on any given hand, but in the long run both selling out cheaply and super-aggressive behaviour are losing tactics.

KEN PENTON: Double. Congratulate opponent for the pre-empt. 3N or 4S could well be the right spot, but a small profit appears for sure.

Finally, the lone vote for 3NT came from a distinguished guest panelist:

ERIC KOKISH: 3NT. It seems more promising to go for a big plus rather than a small one.

An amazing parallel to the previous problem. Again we have 1 lion, 3 lambs and 6 bridge players. An interesting aside: over half of the write-in votes were for the double. Speaking for the lambs:

KRIS JONASSON: Pass. If diamond suit was stronger (KQl0xxx) would bid 4D.

Speaking for the bridge players:

GORD SHARP: 4 diamonds. It's not clear that 4 hearts won't be coming back to me. Then what do I do? At this vulnerability I'll step out now and give partner a chance. Better to be wrong non-vul then let the opponents be right vul.

DOUG DESCHNER: 4 diamonds. A good chance to get your head rung.

There might be a lesson for us in the fact that once again Eric Kokish (5000+ master points, Vanderbilt winner, Olympiad pairs runner-up) took the most aggressive action.

ERIC KOKISH: Double. I know mother wouldn't approve, but in general the "shape" should act. P.S. This is a <u>takeout</u> double, partner... partner, did you hear me?

Mrs. Kokish obviously knows more about this game than I thought.

KEN PENTON, who voted for Pass, noted that he would bid 4 diamonds on a Saturday night at Walt's.

I am disappointed in the panel. The vast majority of our local experts assume partner has 4 aces and launch into a variety of scientific convulsions to determine whether they belong in 6S, 6N, 7S or 7N. They never stopped to think why partner did not double 2S. Why can't North hold: S: Qxxx H: - D: KQJl0xx C: KQJ

JILL SAVAGE: 5 spades. If partner has the 4 aces, he will bid 6 spades, which I will then convert to 7 spades. If partner has the 4 aces and doesn't bid the small slam, I'll be heading for the partnership desk anyway.

Makes sense to me. On the other hand, the following garbage was typical for the myopic-scientist majority:

JOE KERGER: 5NT. I hope partner has only one king so I can employ 6H as a grand slam force, etc., etc.

A regrettable error occurred on this problem, as the vulnerability was accidentally reversed in the KIBITZER (the panel's questionnaire correctly had E-W vulnerable). We were therefore forced to unilaterally assign scores for readers' votes. Please accept our apologies and listen to what the panelists have to say at favorable vulnerability.

The plurality voted for a straightforward 6 hearts. This works out well whenever West has less than 14 points (or so) and less than 6 spades.

CHARLIE LIEGEROT: 6 hearts. All I can afford. Jack Murphy will bid, in order, after successive doubles: 5S, 6C, 6D, 6H. But then Jack always gets full value for his card fees.

Actually, a psyche might work out well against mediocre opposition, while it would only serve to goad good players to the right spot. An instructive tip comes from Montreal:

ERIC KOKISH: 4 hearts. This simple ploy is often best. West will often bid only 4S and East will refuse to "hang" his partner and pass.

At adverse vulnerability, 5 hearts (for a likely -800) is about as high as we can afford to go and the scores were calculated to reflect this fact.

In their comments, most panelists imply that their second double is again primarily takeout-oriented. This seems like wishful thinking. (What if South held AJx AQ10x AKJx xx? Now the panel would also double, but insist this was clearly for penalties.) However, all alternatives that I can think of are worse and therefore I turn the mike over to:

CHARLIE ROBERTS: Double. Partner can convert if his bid was based on a good spade holding.

JOE KERGER: Double. More takeout. More high cards than initial double. I hope partner, if he passes, knows what I'm doing.

And, untypically chicken:

GORD SHARP: Pass. Another toughie! We could be gin for anything (including nothing). With no tricks in my long suit, I'll take a pessimistic view.

Let's listen to the arguments in order. The trump leaders reason like this:

KRIS JONASSON: 10 of hearts. Heart lead called for. Which heart likely immaterial. Need to cut down on diamond ruffs.

This is the least likely of the three ways the slam might be set. After all, dummy's spades should provide ample parking for declarer's diamonds. This brings us to the club leaders:

KEN PENTON: Do not always obey partner!! This contract is being made on dummy's spade suit. Club king will remove entry, once established. Dummy: AK109xx Qxx x Axx.

The trouble with this construction is that West would probably not rebid 3S with this sort of hand.

The diamond-leaders had little to say, other than conserving partnership harmony or praying for a miracle.

I believe the panel shortchanged the spade lead (although MATHESON and KERGER noticed the possibility). What if dummy's outside ace is in trumps and declarer holds a singleton spade? (ie., AKQXXX AX X JXXX opposite x KQJXXX AJXXX A) Now a spade lead kills dummy. Of all readers, only Bruce Niederberger found this lead, which was the winner when the hand was actually played.

40 readers sent in their answers. The winner, with a score of 510, was Ernie Boushy. Mr. Boushy will be invited to join the panel next month. Congratulations also go to runner-up Paul Rushton and to Doug Deschner, who topped all panelists with a perfect 600. (I want to downplay this remarkable achievement, for fear that future panelists attempt to go with the majority rather than bid what they think is right.) All readers are urged to vote on the October problems by using either the coupon or a plain sheet of paper.
