1994 WHITE HATTER TOURNAMENT

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When something happens at the table, which results in the director being called, what rights do you have regarding the director's decision?

- 1. You have no right to an appeal on a ruling that is simply a matter of law. For example you revoke against the pair you would most like to see play in rush hour traffic, and of course the required adjustment is made and the director leaves while you endure another board against these now gloating *\$#@&^%. We've all been there and give you sympathy but that is all. The revoke law is clear and not open to any interpretation whatsoever, and therefore rulings based on it are not subject to appeal.
- 2. Sometimes, in your estimation, the director may have misevaluated a law, for whatever reason, and

when that occurs you have the right to discuss your position with the director, and, if still not satisfied request a committee. These situations commonly occur when the director uses his judgment to assess situations.

A common one: the balk. The auction: 1 spade, 2 hearts (overcall), BALK pass (responder), 3 hearts (advancer), 3 spades (opener) all pass. The hand: ♠ AQXXX ♥ XX ♠ KQX ♣ KX. The director rules that most in the room would not have bid 3 spades, and rolls the auction back to 3 hearts. You argue that 3 spades is clear - anyone would have bid it. Now we have a judgment argument - and one that may be appealed to committee. It is worth noting that you may win the committee if the director is summonsed immediately after the balk, but that you will never win if you call after the hand is played.

IS IT REALLY WORTH IT? - A BOREL SIMULATION

You hold in 1st seat: S AQ52 H J52 D K86 C AQ4 and not unreasonably you open 1NT. Partner bids 3NT, all pass and the 4 of hearts is lead.

Partner tables: S KJ9 H 6 D AJ942 C KJ52 and the opponents quickly take the first 5 tricks in hearts. You note that 4 Spades is a very good match point contract and 6 Diamonds is on a finesse.

Later, when you discuss the hand with partner, he suggests a convention to solve this problem. In response to 1NT, a bid of 3 Hearts or 3 Spades shows 3 cards in that suit, a singleton in the other major, 5-4 or 4-5 in the minors and 10 to 14 HCP. This allows the 1NT opener to set the contract. This seems simple (provided that you remember) but is this a useful convention? Specifically, how often does it come up and what percentage of the time does it help?

I used a computer to simulate these conditions. I looked for situations where North could open 1 NT and South had the conventional response. It was necessary to deal over 50 thousand hands to get 10 examples of this situation! This would indicate that with 1 NT openers in 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th seat it should happen about 40 times, or every 1250 deals.

Unfortunately, as everyone knows, you don't always get an unobstructed auction and whenever the responding hand had 12 or more HCP and got to bid 1st, it would open. Both these factors reduce the incidence substantially.

However, another concern is how often it actually helps. My analysis indicated that this is about 20% of the time. In the other 80% of cases, 3NT is the best spot. Given these factors, this convention should help you every 8 to 10 thousand hands! This might come up twice a year if you play as often as Dann Kramer but the rest of us would be lucky to see it even once a year. Of course, that assumes that all your partners play this way too!

I'm interested in analyzing other such situations for the Kibitzer. If your partner is twisting your arm to try something which you think is perhaps of dubious value, send the details to me (Steven Lawrence 686-3290) and I'll test it out and write it up. If they insist on using it, I can send you the printout of the hands so at least you can practise the bidding!


The Kibitzer needs a new Editor.

SPECIAL EVENTS

During the first three months of 1993, a number of events will be held in town which lead to district and then national level finals. These include:

1) Canadian Open Pairs

Club qualifiers have been held at the clubs. A unit final will be held Sunday, January 17 at the Bow River club where 3 pairs will qualify for the national final in Ottawa on May 19 & 20. Our original information was for a national final at the Victoria Regional in May but this has changed. Sorry!

2) Canadian National Teams Championship (CNTC)

This is open to all players. One remaining club level qualifier is scheduled at the Bow River on Saturday, November 28 at 11 AM. (note change) The unit final will be at the Martinique on Sunday, January 24 at noon. Zone final in Edmonton, the weekend of March 13 & 14.

3) Grand National Teams - Flight B

Open to players with less than 1500 master points, this event allows you to qualify, as individuals, at the club level for participation in the district final. It will be held, the weekend of April 24 & 25 in Great Falls. Tell your club managers that you are interested in this event so they will schedule games!

4) Grand National Teams - Flight C

Open to non life masters, this event starts with club qualifiers to be held this fall. This is followed by a unit final Sunday, February 7 at the Bow River and the above mentioned district final in Great Falls.

5) Grand National Teams - Flight D

This is open to players with less than 100 master points. A unit final will be held Sunday, February 28, at the Martinique to qualify one or more teams for competition at the district final in Great Falls April 24 & 25. This one is lots of fun!

6) Canadian Ladies Teams (CLTC)

Not yet scheduled but probably sometime in May, one team from southern Alberta, will qualify directly for the national final. More details in the next Kibitzer.
