#### ARE YOU A NICE OPPONENT?

At the Unit Annual General Meeting, a motion was made which deplored rude behaviour and the negative effect that such behaviour has on the probability of keeping players coming to our games. Most of these problems are already covered by the ACBL Laws 72~76, the section regarding improprieties. Most of the feedback I have received from all levels of players stresses variations on one general theme: I am a human being. Please treat me as one, starting with the fact that I have a name other than opponent. So, let's have some specifics.

- 1. During any given round, do you normally speak to both of your opponents by name in a conversational manner? I don't and I know that I should, but it's so much easier to think about that last hand and so....
- 2. You are playing against a pair of new guys and their new bidding style, the submarine club. Oops! One of their torpedoes has just given you a zero in a weird way. Do you congratulate them on the result or do you mutter under your breath, (but loudly enough to be heard) something about playing against idiots?
- 3. Your next opponent is the bane of your existence and you are determined to get the ..... Do you (a)get ready to flaunt the Marquis of Queensbury (b)coil yourself into a crouch so that at the least excuse you hurl yourself at your hated foe's throat and tear it open or (c) get cheery, go to the next table and irk your nemesis by sticking your happy face into his/her grumpy face?
- 4. The director is at your table in response to your summons. Do you describe the problem calmly or do you make it sound like a capital offence organized by a group of international terrorists instead of two friendly folks named Helen and Fred?

### RECORDER ARTICLE

Bridge is a highly competitive, exciting, frustrating and emotional experience -that's why we all play it. Unfortunately, all four players at the table usually do not share these experiences and feelings at the same time!

One player/partnership may be excited and flushed with success, while the other is frustrated and maybe even embarrassed. One player may be keyed-up and determined, while his/her opponent is maybe asleep. One player may feel he has been "fixed" by his opponent accidentally pulling the right card at the right time! One player may be more experienced and skilful, while his opponent is still trying to remember that spades rank higher than hearts.

This cauldron of conflicting emotions, which might have been brewing for many rounds, has the potential for causing distress. A player's comments may become a little too demeaning, gloating, irritating or rude. A player may have lost perspective and forgotten his manners. Some players drink a little too much, others may have been unreasonable with directors or third-parties such as hotel and restaurant staff.

The above scenarios fall within the category of "conduct". Another category is "ethics".

There are many possible illustrations of poor ethics, but most involve **partner's** hesitations. Any player can hesitate at any time completely ethically - it is his partner who may be handed the ethical dilemma. Most players realize that they are not allowed to take advantage of any bid or play made by partner that is out of the normal tempo (allowing for skip-bids, etc.). However, many players do take unfair advantage from time to time. It may be deliberate or unconscious, or somewhere in between.

Usually, a player can't help but recognize that his partner has hesitated unduly. If you have a choice of reasonable actions in this situation, you must not choose an action that is more likely to be successful because of the hesitation. Good active ethics requires a continual alertness to ensure that you will always make that extra effort to avoid being unfairly influenced by partner.

Most Units in the ACBL have appointed a "Recorder". The Recorder's mandate is to receive written concerns from anyone regarding the conduct and ethics of anyone else. It doesn't matter whether a director was already involved or not. Some players are a little uneasy about raising concerns at the table, so please write or call the Recorder afterwards. Maybe you feel that a certain player may not be fully aware of his conduct and/or ethics obligations - call the Recorder. It is the Recorder's job to constructively educate. All individual matters are kept strictly confidential.

The Calgary Unit's Recorder is currently Gordon Campbell who can be reached at 270-0315 or at 448 13th Street, N.W., Calgary, T2N 1Z2. Your local club has a special form called the "Player Memo" which is designed to make it easier for you to compile and submit all the necessary information.

#### UNIT TROPHIES

#### 1. PRESIDENT'S TROPHY

There seems to be some confusion as to the rules pertaining to the President's Trophy, so here's an attempt to clear it up.

The trophy is intended to encourage future master attendance at sectionals and will be presented at any, hopefully all, sectionals when there are at least two future master events, each consisting of three or more tables.

A future master is defined as a player in the 0-49 MP category prior to the beginning of the sectional. The winner of the trophy is the player who wins the most master points in the tournament. Should there be a tie, two trophies will be presented.

The winner(s) must play in at least one future master event, but sould there be no such event at a particular session and a future master should collect points in a higher bracketed event, those points will be counted for the President's Trophy, always provided that future masters play together.

There! If you were not confused before, you most certainly are by now!!!

#### 2. ANN WALDIE MEMORIAL TROPHY

As you will read in the enclosed flier for the upcoming September sectional, we will all be playing for the Ann Waldie Memorial Trophy on Sunday, September 12. Being a curious person, it bothered me that I have been playing bridge for many years and yet know very little about the lady. So after a lot of phoning around, let me share my findings with you.

Ann arrived in Calgary from Houston, Texas in 1964 and played the next number of years at Maddie McGill's Club on 17th Avenue. In 1979, she bought the Calgary Bridge Club above Tucker Drugs on 14th Street and some years later she started the Valley Ridge Rubber Bridge Club.
