

HOW TO BE A SLOW PLAYER

- 1. Never arrive before game time. The game never starts then anyway. They're always dealing or duplicating boards for the first few minutes. Why rush? No one will think you're rude or selfish or thoughtless or too stupid to tell time.
- 2. If you do arrive early, stand around and chat with everyone you know. You can fill out your card while the opponents are preparing the boards.
- **3.** Complex systems and conventions help to confuse the opponents. Play as many of them as you can. Don't worry about getting all the details right.
- 4. Never think until it's your turn. What's the point? You can't be sure what to do until you have all the information.
- 5. Write down the contract and the opponents' names before you lead. This will conceal the fact that you hadn't even begun to think about what to lead until the auction was over.
- 6. As Dummy, wait for the lead then carefully write down the contract, then table your cards neatly, one at a time, all nicely perpendicular to the edges of the table.
- 7. Never make a bid or play until you are absolutely sure that there could never be the slightest possibility that there could be some other bid or play you might, at some future time in some possible world, wish you had made instead.
- 8. If you have a choice of cards to play, detach each one from your hand to see how you feel about playing it. Once you have decided, inspect the card carefully to make absolutely sure it is indeed the card you want to play.
- 9. In an unmakeable contract, try to imagine some miracle that will save you. Play slowly. If the opponents become bored or confused they might slip up and then, even if you still get a zero at least you can change the subject.
- 10. When the director comes to your table to remind you that you are falling behind, be sure to take time to point out that it's not your fault.
- 11. Discuss each hand as soon as you have played it, when the emotions are fresh. Do not distract yourself from this important discussion by doing anything like scoring or putting your hand back in the board.
- 12. If you are North you will score twice. First, enter the score correctly in your card, then scribble something on the score sheet. Don't worry about accuracy --- it's the director's job to check all the scores anyway.
- 13. Bridge is a social game, so don't forget that little bit of banter or idle gossip, at least with those people you like enough to talk to. This must be done before you start playing so it doesn't interfere with the post-mortem.
- 14. If you see your next opponents are still playing after the round has been called, first call the director to point this out (see point 10) then, when the late pair starts to move, go for a glass of water.
- 15. Be sure to take the full time allotted for your break. After all, teachers don't make children finish their homework during recess.
- 16. If there's not enough time to go for a smoke between rounds, leave when you are Dummy. Let partner worry about revokes or disputes. Enjoy your cigarette.

UNDISCUSSED AGREEMENTS

Playing duplicate against similar opponents, the following takes place: 1 Club, 2 Clubs (Michaels by you), 3 Hearts, Double by partner followed by RHO asking what the double mean. You answer : "Undiscussed" which brings forth the question: "Well, how are you taking it ?" Grasping frantically at straws you ask your RHO: "Well what's 3 Hearts?" and receive back the answer: "Undiscussed !" So naturally you continue: "How are you going to take it?" Does anyone yet notice something absurd is going on?

This comic situation is caused by both partnerships having no idea of what you are supposed to know when you elect to play a convention. When you play a convention you should know the most common rebids and how your partnership handles simple interference. Active ethics demand that you know the methods that you and your partner use and to fully tell them to your opponents so that all players are competing on a level playing field. A partnership that has played a thousand sessions together has no excuse for not having answers for most common situations and not being able to describe them to their opponents.

When you receive the answer undiscussed you now know that there is no agreement between your opponents and that the opponents are depending on their general bridge knowledge to solve their problem and they that have no obligation to tell you their conclusions. The question how are you going to take that bid should not be asked because either they have no knowledge or they are deliberately withholding information. Back to the same board but it is now played by two partnerships who have discussed their conventions: 1 Club, 2 Clubs, 3 Hearts (Alerted), Double. The 3 Hearts bid is alerted as a splinter showing clubs and a stiff heart. "What's the double?" "It shows a limit raise in hearts or a forcing raise in spades."
