

Lucie McBrearty - George McBrearty Don Adams - Lily Halliday Victor Shymanski - Lore Shymanski In June 1969 the **Bridge World** magazine published an article by Jean René Vernès entitled "The Law of Total Tricks". The author was not a well-known player and few people took notice at the time. The word spread slowly until Larry Cohen published "To Bid or not to Bid" in 1992. The book became a bestseller and now all experts follow "The Law".

What is "The Law"? First of all, it is not a law, no more than "with 26 points and two balanced hands you belong in 3NT" is a law.

But instead of helping you bid balanced hands, "The Law" is a tool that helps you make the right bidding decision in competitive situations. Should you bid one more or should you defend?

"The Law" says:

The total number of tricks available in any deal is equal to the number of trumps.

The **total number of trumps** means the number of cards in **both sides**' longest fit. If North-South have a 10-card spade fit while East-West have a nine-card club fit, the total number of trumps is 19.

The **total number of tricks** means the sum of tricks that **both sides** can make if each plays in their longest fit. If North-South can take 12 tricks in spades and on the same deal East-West could take 7 tricks in clubs, the total number of tricks is 19.

"The Law" says that on most deals these two numbers will be equal. How does that fact help your bidding? Let's look at two examples.

Example 1:

IMPs, neither vulnerable, you hold: ♠xxx ♥Axxx ♦Qxxx ♣xx. The bidding goes:

```
West North East South 1 \spadesuit 3 \spadesuit 4 \spadesuit ??
```

Partner probably has six diamonds; your side has ten trumps. The opponents probably have a nine-card fit (we cannot be sure of course but that is the most likely scenario); so the total number is 19.

How many tricks do you suppose the opponents can make? I would assume they can take 11 tricks. You have one trick and partner might chip in with one if we are lucky. The **Law tells us that if the opponents can take 11 tricks** we can only take 8 (Remember, the total number of tricks is 19) and we will go for 500 in 5♦, more than the value of their game. It is correct to pass 4♠. If the opponents were vulnerable however, 500 would be a good save and you should bid 5♦.

We apparently have an eight-card heart fit, the opponents an eight-card club fit (if partner had a singleton club he should compete to $3 \checkmark$ on his own). There are 16 tricks available. If you can make $3 \checkmark$ (9 tricks) you can beat them two tricks in $3 \checkmark$ (they can take only seven tricks for a total of 16). It is clearly wrong to bid $3 \checkmark$. I would double at matchpoints, and I would pass at IMPs.

PRESIDENT'S TROPHY

The President's trophy is awarded to the future master who wins the most masterpoints in future master events at the Calgary sectional. These are the results for the March sectional.

UNIT 390 BIDDING BOX POLICY

One innovation in duplicate bridge that has become very widespread in recent years has been the availability and use of bidding boxes. The use of bidding boxes should enhance everyone's enjoyment of the game. For instance, the use of bidding boxes allow for a quieter time, there are fewer misunderstood calls, and their use largely does away with the need for reviews of the bidding. All these aspects improve the flow of the game and allow players to concentrate on the more important aspects of bidding and play.

Of course, as with verbal bidding, irregularities in an auction using bidding boxes must be avoided. For example, the fingering of bidding cards in contemplation of making a call should not occur.

Bidding boxes have been available in local clubs for several years. The Calgary Unit purchased bidding boxes in 1995 for use in sectional tournaments. The Unit Board has recently considered a policy concerning the use of bidding boxes at all sectional tournaments and Unit sponsored games at clubs. The local Unit has the authority to set a policy in this area, subject to the overriding policies of the ACBL (eg. Non-discrimination) and the Laws of the game. The policy approved by the Calgary Unit Board is set out below:

- 1. The use of bidding boxes is mandatory in all events at Calgary sectional tournaments and Unit sponsored games at clubs and other venues (whenever they are available).
- 2. An exception to this mandatory use policy will be made when a player is unable to use bidding boxes because of a physical impairment. If questioned, a simple statement or notice (eg. A card on the table) of the fact that one is unable to use bidding boxes because of a physical impairment is sufficient explanation.
- 3. Where one player at a table is unable to use bidding boxes, then no player at the table should use them and all auction calls should be made verbally. An acceptable alternative to this practice is that someone else at the table may place bidding cards on the table in response to a verbal call by the player unable to use the bidding boxes. This other person could be the playing partner or an assistant. This alternative practice must be agreed upon by all players present before the round commences. In case of disagreement, all bidding should proceed verbally.
- 4. Intermittent or inconsistent use of bidding boxes is not allowed. If a player is unable to use bidding boxes at the start of a session or at any time during the session, they must finish that session without using bidding boxes.
- 5 The use or non-use of bidding boxes by any player in contravention of the Unit's stated policy may result in disciplinary action.

You are South playing in 4 Hearts. Although you have 27 points between you and the dummy, your chances do not look good; you know that East has everything. You play low from dummy and win East's nine with the Ace. Lead a heart to the Queen, and ruff a small club with the heart Ace. Lead the eight of hearts to the ten and play the Jack of Clubs which East covers with the Queen. But instead of ruffing, pitch a spade from your hand. East must now help you. His best move is to play another club. (If he plays a spade, duck to the Queen, then win the spade Ace. Cross to the diamond Ace and duck a spade to East while you discard a diamond. East is endplayed again.)

When East plays another club, you can simply pitch a diamond from your hand and ruff in the dummy. Cross to your spade Ace and pull all the trumps. Your hand is now the spade 9 and three small diamonds; the dummy has the 8 and Queen of spades as well as the Ace and Queen of diamonds. Poor East must come down to four cards; he must save King and a small diamond (you will assume that he was 3-3 in spades and diamonds), he must also keep the King of Spades. So now you play a spade, South can win two tricks but then he must lead a diamond away from his King. You make 4 Hearts because you put South in twice to give you two extra tricks.

Never hesitate to elicit the "help" of your opponents to fulfill your contract!
