Most weekend golfers keep playing the game because they remember the one (or two) good shots in an otherwise lackluster outing. Many bridge players share this characteristic. Unfortunately, while I can successfully fool myself about golf (totally without reason), I have never learned to do the same at bridge. I admit, though, that winning removes a bit of the sting from hands I prefer to forget.

Last month, my team-mates (Judith Gartaganis, Gordon Campbell and Keith Balcombe) and I returned home with the Canadian National Team Championship title. We played solidly, but the errors I made still haunt me. In the second quarter of the semi-finals, the match was progressing nicely (up 25 IMPs with a number of favourable results in the bank). On board 30 I picked up:

My left-hand opponent started with a strong club and Judy overcalled 1NT showing a 2-suiter – either hearts and clubs or diamonds and spades. It is sound strategy to try to disrupt strong club auctions with any excuse. Right-hand opponent passed showing negative values. My hand left me no doubt that Judy had hearts and clubs for her overcall. I decided to muddy the waters with 2D feeling that the subsequent auction would reveal a fit for our side, however unlikely that seemed. Judy was supposed to correct (to hearts) if she held hearts and clubs. At the time, I remember thinking that the opponents might double 2H and that my hand had the potential to provide enough tricks to make that contract. No strong club pair worth their salt will allow their opponents to buy the contract for a mere 2D so I was confident the auction would not die.

To my surprise LHO bid 2H. Judy passed and RHO gave considerable thought before passing. It was clear to me what was happening. The opponents had landed in a 5-1 heart fit (assuming Judy had four hearts) and RHO had decided not to make matters worse by trying to improve the contract. I passed and Judy led he Jack of spades. My face turned various shades of red when dummy was tabled. These were the four hands:

The opponents easily made the contract with two overtricks and I could see immediately that we were cold for slam in spades! At the other table the player holding my hand bid 2H at the critical point in the auction. Subsequently North/South "sacrificed" in 6S and got doubled to collect a cool 1210. We lost 16 IMPs on this board and I still wince when I recall this hand.

Fortunately not all hands were the kind to cause nightmares. Late in the fourth quarter of the same match, in first seat with both vulnerable I picked up:

I opened 2D showing 11 - 16 HCP with at least nine cards in the minors. LHO bid 2NT, Judy passed and RHO jumped to 4H. What now? I certainly hadn't travelled 3,750 kilometres to pass with hands like this one, so I bid a sporting 5C. My opponents doubled, expressing the opinion that I was too high. LHO led the King of hearts. These were the four hands:

After ruffing the King of hearts I led a spade. When East ducked I played the King. The favourable lie of the minor suits now allowed me to make eleven tricks (ruff a heart and lead a club;

win the next trick; pull the outstanding trumps ending in the dummy and play a diamond to the Queen or ten – both lines succeed). Even if Turner wins the Ace of spades he still has a problem. There is a danger that the spade suit will provide 5 tricks if I have a doubleton spade. One of East's option is to continue a spade to cut me off from the spade suit. If he does so I can play the Jack of spades to establish the suit (whether or not West covers) and therefore secure four diamond pitches (with the Queen of clubs as the entry to dummy). If Turner subsequently tries to strand the spade suit by sacrificing his club trick (duck the King of clubs when I lead towards the Queen) I can change tactics by playing on diamonds thereby losing only one diamond and one spade. The killing defense is to win the Ace of spades and return a heart (or a diamond). That leaves an inescapable loser in each minor. 5C doubled was worth +750. At the other table our partners conceded -500 when they went down two in 5H doubled. Making 5C doubled netted a 6IMP gain. Had 5C been defeated, our opponents would have won 12 IMPs.

Which hand is more memorable? I will vividly recollect the first hand for years to come. The second hand will quickly fade from memory to be recalled only when someone prods me by saying, "you must have done something right to win"!

# AN ODE TO TERRENCE REESE, WRITTEN IN HIS STYLE

Terrence Reese is no longer with us but he was one of Britain's top players for many years. He wrote several excellent bridge books, but I am thinking of *Play These Hands with Me* and *Play Bridge with Me*. In these Mr. Reese describes his thoughts as he bids and plays 60 hands. When I played this hand (MBS, 06/18, board 18) I played the A at the critical moment and went down but I should have made the contract. This is how Mr. Reese might have described the hand. I hope you enjoy it; I enjoyed writing it.

Playing in a club pairs game with a woman of some ability against earnest opponents, vulnerable versus not, I am first to speak with: <sup>a</sup> A K 10 7 5 © A 4 3 "A 3 § A J 3.

I have no qualms about opening 2NT especially since we are playing puppet Stayman where partner can inquire whether I have a 5-card major. The opponents pass throughout and partner bids  $3^a$  showing either a raise to 3NT or a minor suit slam hand. I bid 3NT and partner passes.



Partner has 3 hearts. Why she didn't bid 3♣ asking for a 5-card major is beyond me, I might have had 5 hearts. In any case we are in the normal contract. I have six top tricks with excellent chances in spades and clubs. I must duck the first heart and see what develops. West continues with ♥J and East discards a diamond. That changes things. West has enough tricks to defeat me should he regain the lead and I have no way to duck any tricks to East. I could refuse the second heart but since I would like to retain a small heart for a possible throw-in I win the trick.


Now I must play the spades for five tricks. When I lead a small spade to the  $\triangle Q$  West hesitates slightly and plays the  $\triangle 8$ . I win the  $\triangle Q$  and since a 4-2 split is more likely than 3-3 I finesse the  $\triangle 10$  with some confidence.

This works as West follows small. I cash my other 3 spades pitching 2 clubs and 1 diamond from dummy. West discards 2 diamonds and 1 club while East follows to 4 rounds and discards 1 club. The situation is now:



I need 3 more tricks and I am sure I have them if I can figure out the opponents' distribution. West started with 2 spades and 6 hearts and 5 minor suit cards. He has 4 hearts and 2 minor suit cards left - either 2 diamonds or 2 clubs or 1 of each. If he has 1 diamond and 1 club left I can cash my minor suit aces in either order and lead a club, East will win the club but I will get a ninth trick in either clubs or diamonds. But I don't really think West has come down to a card in each minor. If West has 2 diamonds or 2 clubs I can succeed but it is vital that I cash the minor suit ace of West's void first. West could be either 2-6-4-1 (and has 2 diamonds left) or 2-6-2-3 (and has 2 clubs left); 2-6-2-3 is more likely but I can't tell which from West's plays, what about East?

East's first discard was a diamond. This suggests 5 diamonds but let's check. East is known to be 41 in the majors and either 3-5, 4-4, or 5-3 in diamonds and clubs. A diamond discard from three to an honour when holding 5 clubs would be unusual so I am going to play East for starting with at least 4 diamonds. Also, if East had 5 diamonds West is 2-6-2-3. This means West must have at least one club remaining so I cash the diamond ace and West, after some thought, discards a heart. I lead my small heart and West has to lead into my club tenace at trick 12 so I make 3NT, losing only four hearts. Everyone else is down either 2 or 3, the full hand being:




#### **Post-Mortem Analysis:**

There were three points of interest, the first being the decision to win the second heart. Since there was no longer any need to holdup keeping a small heart might prove useful.

Once West showed up with 6 hearts it was routine to play him for only 2 spades, the 4-2 break being twice as likely as the 3-3 break. I mentioned in the narrative that West hesitated slightly when I led a small spade to the queen. This calmed any fears I had of West's spades being J8. I didn't think he could have a problem with  $\clubsuit J8$  doubleton, but he might wonder what to do with 8x doubleton.

The strip squeeze end position was interesting.

In the diagrammed position, I cashed ◆A and West was squeezed out of a winning heart or his club guard. He opted to discard a heart. I then led my heart and West was forced to lead a club after cashing 3 hearts. Obviously if West had discarded a club on the ◆A, I would have cashed the ♣A next and made two more tricks by playing ♣Q under my ♣A when I saw West's ♣K. The contract was secure even if East held all the minor suit honours (proof left to the reader). If I had cashed the ♣A first I would have been defeated. West would discard a heart on the following ◆A and I would lose the rest.
