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# AWC Bridge Club - A Long and Fabulous Run!

The AWC Bridge Club and the American Women's Club of Calgary were intertwined entities. "In March of 1912, Mrs. Herbert Edgar Anderson extended an invitation to all American women in Calgary interested in forming a social club to meet at her home in Lower Mount Royal. Seventy-five women responded. Formal organization was set for April 11, 1912 at Unity Hall, Calgary. There was need for a group where wives of American engineers and businessmen, often in Calgary on a temporary basis, could meet friends and participate in social activities". The inaugural constitution committed the organization: "to be an organized centre of action, for the promotion of social life, and for cooperation with other local organizations in carrying out of improvements - civic and philanthropic; and to be a means of mutual improvement. Neither theological questions nor partisan politics shall be discussed."

For many years, the women met in each other's homes, mostly in Mount Royal (what some at that time called 'American Hill'). Typical functions included teas, picnics, a big social affair on American Thanksgiving, an annual ball at the Palliser, and, of course, bridge. There was an official membership, initially restricted to American-born women, and later relaxed to allow Canadian born daughters of Americans.

The club was prestigious and influential and, as it flourished, a more established meeting place was needed. The West End Telephone Exchange Building - Calgary's first telephone exchange (built around 1910 and vacated in about 1923) at 1010 - 14<sup>th</sup> Avenue SW became available and the industrious members of the AWC created and sold cookbooks, raising the \$3,000 to purchase and renovate the building in 1938. With a tangible asset, the AWC needed further formalization and incorporated under the Alberta Societies Act on June 28, 1938. Functions previously held in people's homes, including bridge, shifted to the new location which opened in October 1938. In its heyday, the AWC

had over 100 members and over twenty committees coordinated a wide variety of activities, including bridge. The vibrant 'new' facility also was home to the Calgary Boys Choir which rented the basement.

Bridge at the club began as social bridge, including a variety of bridge parties and 'Dessert Bridge' which featured delicious desserts supplied by members. Thursday evening duplicate bridge (non-sanctioned) was started by Mrs. Jessie Kinder in 1970 and shortly afterward, Marguerite (Swanson) Perry established the first sanctioned Wednesday afternoon game - a game that continued to 2007. In about 1977, in response to many players, Marguerite designated AWC's Friday night game as 'non smoking' - Calgary's first.

A tower of strength through much of the recent history of AWC was Emily Follensbee (November 13, 1903 - October 22, 2003) who for many years served as President. When Marguerite left as Director of the AWC game, Emily became a Director under Walt Alex's tutorship, and she took over running the AWC bridge games. The Wednesday sanctioned game was especially popular, frequently having 11 or 12 tables. With the passing of Emily Follensbee, Mrs. Grace King directed the Wednesday game. Yvonne Hess taught bridge lessons at AWC for many years, and also helped with directing. Her lessons focused on the nuances and competitive nature of duplicate bridge as most members were already seasoned players of social bridge.

The AWC facility was a charming building decorated with a lot of artifacts, mostly with a USA-Canada theme. Those who played also noticed the unique 'card theme' table cloths created by Helen Degenstein in about 1990, and the wide variety of decks of cards (no ACBL cards here). An interesting feature of the Wednesday game was the mid-game car shuffle ... with 2-hour parking, players had to move their cars at the 2 hour mark, each going to the parking spot vacated by the other. The club location was perfect for bridge players travelling by bus.

With a dwindling membership and the increase in city property taxes, the AWC facility became less and less

viable. The AWC constitution stipulated that the building could not create a profit, and if sold, any profit arising would have to be donated to a charity. In October of 2007 the building was donated to the Children's Legal & Educational Resource Centre (CLERC) - a 'not for profit' organization. Documents were donated to the Glenbow Archives, as was the Alice Innes painting of Burlington Falls, Ontario that hung prominently in the classy clubhouse. The Innes painting had been donated by founding member and 1936 President, Mrs. E. T. (Anne) Chritchley on the occasion of the  $58^{th}$  Anniversary of AWC in 1970. The last game of bridge was played at the American Women's Club on Wednesday October 24, 2007. The AWC Bridge Club relocated the following Wednesday, under the new direction of Barry Pashak, to Scarboro United Church.

Although sanctioned duplicate bridge was provided at other Calgary clubs before the AWC, in many respects the AWC provided the longest operating bridge club in Calgary. The many bridge players who enjoyed games at AWC would echo Grace King's (perhaps understated) comment, "We had a good run".


Here are a few insights and bits of advice from Barbara and Doris:


Fees for the program are \$100 per participant and participants who are District 18 members will be eligible for a subsidized rate.

## Clues From The Bidding

Playing against the 10<sup>th</sup> seed in the Vanderbilt you enter the fourth quarter with a surprising lead of 50 IMPs. However, with 16 boards still to play, your expert opponents are more than capable of overcoming this deficit. On the first board of the last quarter, no one vulnerable, you pick up a nice hand: \*AJ762 \*KJ \*KQ7 \*A72. You start the auction with a Precision 1\* and LHO interferes with 2\* (natural). Partner passes, showing less than 8 HCP. RHO passes and you bid 2\*. LHO isn't done yet and continues with 2NT. Partner bids 4\* and everyone passes. LHO leads the K\* and partner tables a good dummy. Now it is up to you to bring home the game.


Prospects look good, but LHO's bid of 2NT is worrisome. Typically 2NT suggests two places to play with the initial suit being 6 cards in length. Since spades are unlikely to divide 3-2, you need to time the hand properly to ruff both your club losers and score some of the small trumps in your hand.

You win the opening lead with the A and lead the J. LHO gives the J a long look and plays low. You still cannot tell if LHO's second suit is hearts or diamonds. You continue by ruffing the A6 in dummy (RHO's carding suggests 3 cards in clubs) and continue with a low heart to the King. LHO wins the A4 and plays the

\*Q which you ruff in dummy. RHO has played his hearts showing an odd number (i.e. three or five). Now what?

You cash the K (LHO follows with the 8) and continue with the Q discarding the 2. Surprisingly, LHO follows to the Q. You now have a good picture of the distribution. LHO appears to be 1-4-2-6. You continue with dummy's last heart, ruffing with the 6 as RHO pitches the 6. At this juncture, you exit the Q to LHO's A. Back comes a diamond to the Q and your King. With only AJ7 remaining in hand, you exit the A7. As suspected, LHO discards. RHO wins cheaply with the A9 but is endplayed into giving you the last two tricks.

The four hands were:



LHO's bidding provided a valuable clue that helped you find a successful line of play. This board turned out to be a push when, at the other table, West simplified the play for declarer by switching to the  $\clubsuit 8$  after winning the  $\blacktriangledown A$ .

The good news ... your team manages to hold on to its lead and win the match. The bad news is that your team gets annihilated the next day, proving once again that bridge is a never-ending rollercoaster of highs and lows!

### Are You a Good Teammate?

This article was inspired by an item written by David Stern which appeared in the 2008 Gold Coast Congress Bulletin #7. David, who served as NPC of the Australian team for the 2007 World Olympiad in Shanghai, has kindly given us permission to use some of his ideas.

Many bridge players have their own ideas about what makes a good teammate. Although most of these concepts are well-known, they do not often appear in print and are even more rarely practiced. Here are some important ones:

- Don't mark your score sheet with circles, question marks or other indicators of your feelings about a particular board (for example ... circling the board number when you think it's a bad board). All this does is empower your opponents, some of whom may not even realize that they have had a good result until they see you circle it, think about it a bit more and come to the same conclusion.
- Another action which empowers your opponents is discussing hands at the table (invariably, we are drawn to discussing our bad results ...). Imagine how pleasing it is for the opponents when you discuss how you should have played a hand to make it rather than going down as you just have.
- When you leave the playing area to compare with your teammates, proceed immediately to find them and score the results. It is very frustrating for your teammates, who have no doubt been wondering why you have been so slow, to see you dawdling toward them while discussing the hands. Even worse is being so late that the other team has already finished comparing and are congratulating one another!
- Prior to the comparison, do not voice an opinion as to how you think your set went. No "we did poorly" or "we had a good set". Why speculate when the answer will be in front of everybody within a moment or two?
- During the comparison, don't comment or ask what happened on a board. We've all been there ... "+620" say your teammates "-1100" say you. "What happened there?" ask your teammates. That makes players feel like they are letting the side down.

- Don't look for referees. You know how it works ...
  you are sure you are right and that partner is
  wrong. You go around asking enough people until you
  can prove that either 1) you are, indeed, a genius or
  that 2) you should avoid discussing the hand or
  people's opinions with partner.
- Try to discuss hands at the end of the day (preferably over relaxing refreshments), not between sessions. It is a poor use of your energy discussing hands when you should be recharging your battery for the next session.
- Respect, respect, respect. Presumably, you are
  playing with your partner because you respect
  his/her bridge ability and maybe even because you
  enjoy his/her company. The same goes for
  teammates. It is important to cultivate mutual
  respect among all team members.
- Don't prejudge any matches or any boards. You
  have teammates and the respect discussed above
  should carry through to having confidence in their
  ability to help your scores when you need it.

So how do you rate? We can all create a more positive atmosphere by practicing these team etiquette rules.



## A Fun Hand From San Francisco

On the last day of the San Francisco Nationals, I was playing in the North American Swiss teams with an old partner, Keith Balcombe, of Oshawa, when this memorable hand arose.



Dealer: East

Vulnerable: East/West

<u>North</u>	<u>East</u>	<u>South</u>	<u>West</u>

5♥	DBL	All pass	

After East opened 2NT, I, as a happily non-vulnerable South, ventured 3 v. West continued with 4 • and Keith, as North, put on the pressure with a great bid of 5 v. East had little option but to double, ending the auction.

Keith had no idea who could make what, but he knew he didn't want to defend against 4 &, and where was that spade suit anyway?

West led the \*9 covered by the 10, Queen and Ace.

I reasoned that opener likely held a 5-card spade suit, with the spades being distributed 4-5. On the bidding, West was very likely to be 4-7. But was he 4-1-7-1 or 4-0-7-2?

If West is 1-1 in the round suits, declarer must play trumps immediately to prevent West from ruffing a club. If 0-2, then declarer must play a spade immediately to ensure two spade ruffs in dummy.

Needless to say, I guessed wrong and played a trump to dummy's  $\vee$ A. But there was another string to my bow. I carefully ruffed a diamond back to hand, before playing a spade. East won and, as predicted, played  $\vee$ K followed by  $\vee$ 10.

I was able to win, ruff a spade in dummy and ruff a second diamond, bringing down the  $\bullet A$ .

Dummy had a surprising entry in the \$3 to enable a spade discard on the established \$K\$. Lucky that the \$2 was in my hand! It is not often that a 5-level "sacrifice" succeeds when the opponents open 2NT. Yet another example emphasizing that "points don't matter - it is all about fit"!
