President's Message

As I start my term as your Unit president, I am encouraged by the number of new players who have joined the Calgary Duplicate Bridge Association. We welcome all of you and hope that you enjoy playing bridge with us. At present, we have more than 700 members. Hopefully everyone will find playing bridge a positive experience.

That brings me to my next point. The biggest complaint I have heard so far concerns rude behaviour, although there are only a few culprits. The ACBL has a policy of 'zero tolerance' for all sanctioned events. What that means is that rudeness is totally unacceptable at any bridge game. I don't know how many times this has to be restated, but some of our players don't seem to think that it applies to them. If you are subjected to rude behaviour at your table, call the director immediately and explain the situation. Do not allow this form of behaviour to continue. I encountered this at the September sectional, and took the opportunity to tell a person that he was no longer welcome at our sectionals. I think that strict enforcement of this policy will make bridge much more pleasant for the rest of us.

We are looking for someone who will take pictures of our members for the Unit web site. This requires a digital camera and the ability to compress the size of the image file (easily taught to anyone). These are then sent to our webmaster who adds them to the 'Photos' section of our website. Please call me at (403) 249-9614 if you are willing to do this job.

If you or a fellow bridge player are not getting the e-mails Jim Berglund sends regarding news and events in our unit, you should first e-mail or telephone the ACBL (check the ACBL website: http://www.acbl.org).

Secondly, you should e-mail Jim (jazzzbo@shaw.ca) or phone him with your information. If you don't change your e-mail with ACBL headquarters in Memphis, the monthly list Jim receives from them may override any corrections he has made to his list.

Our mentorship program will be starting soon and we are in need of more mentors. If you have 200 masterpoints and have signed up to be a mentee, then you should be willing to sign up as a mentor for someone with less than 100 masterpoints. Didn't anyone tell you that it was more blessed to give than to receive? How great of you to give back to a fellow bridge player all that you will learn from your mentor! 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Good Luck Fellows...Good Skills Partner

John (Jack) Terence Murphy, one of the most influential leaders of Calgary's post-WWII bridge scene, was born in Medicine Hat on August 10, 1920. Jack was a CPR locomotive engineer for 45 years. Bridge was a key hobby for Jack, both before and after his marriage to Lil. The family relocated to Calgary in 1957 and Jack quickly became immersed in the bridge community, playing at the Martinique Bridge Studio and the other clubs of that era.

Jack liked to be in charge. He served on the Unit 390 Board from 1963 to 1972, including a term as President. He was a powerful force behind the first regionals in Alberta, serving as tournament Chairperson for Calgary in 1967, 1970, and 1973. He was the Alberta representative on the ACBL District 18 Board, the Zone V representative to the Canadian Bridge Federation (1971 - 1980) and CBF President (1974 - 1976).

Jack was a good public speaker, often announcing winners at tournaments. He was the one who encouraged Monsignor Le Fort to create the Canmar Bridge Club in Calgary.

Looking at Jack's book collection, an extremely well thumbed copy of Sheinwold's "5 Weeks to Winning Bridge" stands out and must have been a treasured bridge guide. In 1966, at the age of 46, Jack achieved Life Master status. Lil attained that same goal in September of 1991 and was a respected bridge teacher.

One memorable trait was Jack's advice while tabling the dummy after the opening lead: "Good luck fellows, good skills, partner". Jack rarely got averages, just tops or bottoms. He frequently commented "just two more successful finesses and we'll make this contract."

Jack was a very sincere person. He cared about bridge ... about the game, and about the people who played the game. He gave bridge his all. At the same time he was a mischievous person with a great sense of humour, very much liking to entertain by telling jokes.

He was a member of the Burlington Liars' Club. One of his favourite stories was to recall a trip on a fishing boat off the coast of Ireland with some cousins. He would tell a tale of being sick and, when advised to go to the back of boat to discharge over the side, he returned without his false teeth, reporting that the teeth went overboard in one of his spasms. Back at the dock as fish were being unloaded, Jack secretly placed his false teeth into the mouth of one of the caught fish. When the fish with the toothy mouth was noticed, Jack went over, popped out the dentures and refitted his own mouth. The fish must have picked them up when his teeth went overboard, he claimed.

Jack and Lil had 3 sons and 5 daughters, many of whom play bridge today. As kids, some were given math assignments to work out table movements in that 'pre-computer' era.

Jack was an amateur archaeologist and made many trips to Head Smashed In Buffalo Jump to look for artifacts long before that location was declared a Heritage Site. He also had a strong interest in native culture, especially the Blackfoot Nation. It may have been Jack's idea to organize the induction of Charles Goren, Oswald Jacoby, Eric Murray and Sami Kehela into the Blackfoot Nation when they were invited quests and participants in early Calgary regionals.

Jack served as a member of the Honour Guard during the visit of Pope Paul II in 1984. About 1989 Jack was co-winner of a 6/49 lottery, sharing the \$2 million win with about 30 others. Jack purchased a banjo for himself and donated the remainder of his winnings.

Jack died in Calgary on March 9, 1992. At that time he was a Silver Life Master with 1714 MPs. Lil Murphy died 3 years later, by then holding 447 MPs.

The Hattie Joffe Memorial Trophy is awarded each year to the Albertan winning the most masterpoints during the annual Alberta Regional Bridge Tournament. The trophy was donated by Hattie's son, Jay, in memory of his mother.

Hattie Joffe (1903 - 1982) was a prominent Calgary bridge player in the 1950's, 60's and 70's. She was the first ACBL Life Master from Alberta.





In A Good Cause...

Meet Your Unit 390 Executive Board

The ACBL is divided into 25 geographical areas (covering Canada, Mexico and the United States) called Districts. Each District is subdivided into Units with the size of each Unit varying considerably. In some cases a Unit encompasses only part of a big city while in other cases, it covers an entire U.S. state. The ACBL has more than 300 Units.

The Unit supervises ACBL bridge activities and conducts tournaments at the local and sectional levels. It also oversees, and sometimes coordinates, local legs of multi-level ACBL-wide events such as the North American Pairs (NAP) and Grand National Teams (GNT). The officers and board members of Units elect the District's representative to the ACBL Board of Directors.

The Canadian Bridge Federation (CBF) is an adjunct organization that looks after the interests of Canadian bridge players. The CBF is recognized by both the ACBL and the World Bridge Federation. The CBF organizes and runs multi-level Canadian events held annually at the Canadian Bridge Championship. Some of these events (such as the CNTC and the CWTC) are used to select the teams that will represent Canada in international competitions.

Calgary Unit 390 is in ACBL District 18 (Wyoming, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Utah, Montana and Idaho). Unit 390 is within CBF Zone V (Alberta, Saskatchewan and Northern Manitoba).

Remember to smile the next time you see one of your Unit 390 Board members, and give them a pat on the back. They are volunteers who work hard on your behalf.

Timing Is The Key

There is always a bit of nervous anticipation as one awaits the dummy, wondering whether or not your partnership has done well in the bidding. The following hand from the 2008 Alberta regional was no exception:

Contract: 6♠ Lead: ◆K

- ♠ 10982
- **y** 75
- **•** 86
- ♣ AJ1083



- ♠ AKQ54
- ♦ A104
- **♣** K

Maybe the bidding wasn't so great. On a good day, with trumps 2-2 and either the AQ or the AQ tripleton, you will make 13 easy tricks. Oh well. This is not the time to fret over the bidding. You win the first trick with the A and lay down the A. Yikes! RHO pitches a low diamond and all of a sudden your comfortable contract which began with several possibilities to score an overtrick has become something of a problem.

The first option is to overtake the *K with the *A and lead to the *J, hoping to discard dummy's diamond on the third round of hearts (assuming the finesse against the *Q is successful). Then you can continue on a crossruff. Another possibility is to cash the *K and then play three rounds of hearts, ruffing in dummy. Once in the dummy pitch a diamond on the *A and take a ruffing finesse against the *Q. A third option is to forget the ruffing finesse and just try for a straight crossruff (once two rounds of clubs have been cashed). You must hope you can score one or both of the little trumps in your hand by ruffing clubs.

After some consideration you decide to reject option #1 and delay the choice between options #2 or #3 until you play three rounds of hearts. When you ruff the third round of hearts, LHO follows with the \mathbf{Q} .

Time to take stock. LHO is known to have 4 spades and 3 hearts. To have a realistic chance to make the contract he must have at least 3 clubs (remember, you need to score at least one small trump by ruffing a club). In fact further analysis indicates he needs to have 4 clubs; otherwise there is no way to avoid a diamond loser along with a trump loser. Now that the ♥J is a winner, there is successful line of play which involves ruffing the third round of clubs and playing the ♥J. What is LHO to do? If he pitches his fourth club, you pitch a diamond and ruff a diamond. Your only loser is a trump. If he ruffs low, you overruff and ruff the fourth round of clubs. In the end position the opponents only score one trick because the losing diamond and the AJ will be telescoped into the same trick. The final variation occurs when LHO ruffs in with the AJ and returns a trump. Again you are in good shape. You pitch a diamond when he ruffs and can comfortably crossruff for 12 tricks.

The four hands were:

After an unlucky beginning (because trumps split 4-0), you achieve a happy ending. But it is all about timing your moves perfectly. If you cash a second round of trumps before playing the \checkmark J, LHO can ruff in with the \blacktriangle J and return a trump (which is what happened at the other table). This extracts your last trump from dummy and leaves you with a diamond loser.

Maybe it's a good thing your bidding isn't so great!

Freshly Squeezed



In this year's Canadian National Team Championship (CNTC), our squad finished 4th in the round robin and faced a tough team (Fraser) in the quarterfinals. The format allows the team finishing first to select its quarterfinal opponent from among those finishing 5th through 8th. The 2nd place team gets the next choice and so forth. The 4th place team gets the opponent no one else wants to play! We lost the 64-board match by 6 IMPs (ouch!). Nevertheless there were some highlights.

It's not often that the defenders are able to squeeze declarer ... usually it is the other way around. It is midway through the first quarter and, so far, the match has progressed nicely. You pick up *KQ *2 *A10964 *109752. With everyone vulnerable, RHO opens 1* and you overcall 1* (not likely to be a unanimous choice, but our partnership style is to overcall aggressively). LHO passes and partner bids 1*. RHO decides he has enough to bid 1NT and you have a comfortable pass. LHO passes and now partner doubles. RHO "escapes" to 2* which you elect to double (after all, you do have 5 trumps and 2* doubled isn't game). Everyone passes and when you lead the *2 you see this dummy: *1052 *Q10876 *J85 *84.


Partner wins the ♥J and plays the ♥K while declarer follows with the $\checkmark4$ and $\checkmark9$. Because you know partner also holds the VA, his play of a "lower high heart" suggests something in the lower ranking suit (diamonds) rather than in the higher ranking suit (spades). Partner switches to the \$9 which declarer wins with the A. Declarer starts drawing trumps and seems nonplussed when partner shows out on the second club (partner's discard reaffirms something in diamonds). Declarer can't think of anything better to do than playing four rounds of trumps. Now declarer exits a low spade and you are in with the AK. After pulling declarer's last trump with your \$10, you lead a small diamond over to partner's • K, allowing partner to lay down the VA. Look what happens to poor declarer! He is ignominiously squeezed in spades and diamonds.

The four hands were:



¹No doubt believing it would be a safe haven

This position is reached with South to lead:



On the \$10, dummy must discard the \$10 (if a heart, partner keeps \$\infty A5\$ as winners and throws the \$\infty 8\$) and declarer follows with his last trump. Now South underleads the \$\infty A\$ and everyone follows as North wins the \$\infty K\$. When North leads the \$\infty A\$ at trick ten declarer has only losing alternatives: discarding the \$\infty J\$ will establish North's \$\infty 8\$; discarding a diamond allows South to score two diamond tricks.

The defensive squeeze collects +800 and 12 IMPs. Still, the opponents have the last laugh as they move on to the semi-finals while we are left to lick our wounds.
