Walter Brock Appointed to Goodwill Committee

The ACBL Board of Directors has appointed Unit 390's Walter P. Brock as a lifetime member of the ACBL Goodwill Committee. Walter played his initial game of duplicate at the Martinique in 1953 and started playing regularly in 1985. Walter recalls winning his first gold points in 1988, the year Calgary hosted the Winter Olympics. Walter became a Life Master in 1989 and a Silver Life Master in 2002. Walter was presented with a Goodwill Committee lapel pin in recognition of his new honorary role.

The ACBL Goodwill Committee pursues a number of endeavours, such as promoting active ethics, making bridge available to those with disabilities and supporting junior programs. The ACBL's Top 10 goodwill actions are:

- Greet and welcome opponents
- Always say, "Director, please"
- Lead or place dummy before you write
- Mentor a new player
- Say, "Thank you, Partner"
- Compliment opponent's play
- Discuss hands after the game
- Accept defeat and victory with grace
- Leave a tidy table
- Smile often!

Goodwill Day is celebrated the Monday of each North American Bridge Championship (NABC), most recently March 16th in Houston.

Nominations are made by the ACBL District 18 Board members based on input from Units within the District. Previous appointees to the Goodwill Committee from Unit 390 include Delores Hedley (2006), Jacky Ross (1991), Pat Smolensky (1989), William Brown (1984), Linda Thierman (1975), and Mrs. R.E. Davis (1970).



Calgary White Hat Regional A Retrospective by Ken Scott

In the 1950s, interest in bridge surged world wide and bridge leaders in Calgary started thinking about hosting a Regional tournament. A number of intrepid bridge aficionados gained sanction for the inaugural 'Northern Rocky Mountain Regional' to be held July 16-22, 1962 at the Palliser. The Regional achieved over 1,200 tables; one game alone hosted 130 tables and raised over \$2,500 to benefit a local charity.

Charles Goren (1901-1991) was the invited special guest with his fees sponsored jointly by Unit 390 and Sick's Brewery in Lethbridge. Goren participated in three days of the Regional (often partnering Hattie Joffe). Goren was initiated into the Blackfoot tribe as 'Chief Deer Horn', a designation derived from the original significance of his family name (and perhaps because of his many points!). Pat Smolensky served as host for Goren and recalls him as brilliant, frugal, and an amazing sports statistician.

A feature of that tournament was a bridge symposium held at the Jubilee Auditorium with Goren lecturing and his 'girl Friday' (Pat) assisting by writing the demonstrated hands on a blackboard. For one hand, Pat listed a 14th card and, when an audience member pointed it out, Goren quickly and smoothly quipped, 'I work my side of the room and my caddy works the other side'. After the Regional, Goren sent a 'thank you' letter to Pat on his custom stationary, simply and elegantly headed with Charles H. Goren • 111 East 56th Street • New York 22, N.Y. and signed "Charlie".

Numerous other superstars of bridge attended the 1962 Regional, including Oswald Jacoby (1902-1984) who was also initiated into the Blackfoot tribe, as 'Chief Morning Plume'. One of the many highlights of the Regional was the between sessions marriage of then promising Director, Harry Morrison.

The second Regional was held at the Calgary Inn (Westin), July 17-23, 1967. By then, a very active bridge community had evolved in Calgary. There were about 8,300 Life Masters in the world and 9 lived in Calgary - the most in Alberta! This second 'White Hat' Regional achieved 1,555 tables, which bettered the 1962 count by 28% and set a District 18 record. The panel show alone (with featured guests Marilyn Johnson, Peter Rank, Mary Jane Farell, Hermine Baron and Phil Wood) attracted a capacity crowd of over 300.

Eric Murray and Sami Kehela were invited guests for Calgary's third Regional (July 20-26, 1970) at the Calgary Inn. They, too, were initiated into the Blackfoot Nation; Murray as 'Chief Ermine Horn' because he was a Toronto Barrister (and wore robes in his profession), and Kehela as 'Chief Running Rabbit'. About 500 attended the brunch at which Murray and Kehela received their honorary designations. That 'White Hat' Regional achieved 2,195 tables, a 40% increase over 1967 and, once again broke the District 18 record.

A newspaper account of the 1970 tournament mentions several factors as contributing to the fabulous turnout:

- Tremendous program staged by the Unit headed by Tournament Coordinator Jack Murphy. The Unit spent more than \$2,000 of its own funds on the Regional.
- 2) The sumptuous playing area of the venue.
- Coinciding meeting of the Canadian Bridge Federation.
- 4) Tremendous promotion by the Unit, the Western Conference, and the Canadian Tourist Bureau.

In following years, the 'every third year' White Hat Regional tried a number of venues including the Marlborough and more recently the Crossroads Radisson. At one time Red Deer was included in Unit 390, but with growth, it emerged as its own Unit (248) and host to Alberta Regionals. Now Regionals in Alberta rotate amongst Calgary, Red Deer and Edmonton, with Lethbridge hosting an extra Alberta Regional every third year. The game has changed a lot - smoke free venues, zero tolerance play, bidding boxes and bidding more and more with less and less, but no Calgary Regional ever surpassed the 2,195 tables of 1970.

Unit 390 Mentorship Program

Very soon, you will be seeing information about the Mentor/Mentee Program which is scheduled to begin September 1, 2009 and end December 31, 2009. Approximately 20 volunteers have agreed to help organize the Mentorship Program. I would also like to thank everyone who has provided feedback to help us make this year's program even better than last year's.

Our Vision for the Mentorship Program is to improve the quality of bridge so that Calgary and area players can compete confidently at North American events. The program has proven very successful and we want it to continue flourishing.

There is an application form for anyone who would like to request a mentor. If you are interested, please fill out this form and leave it at the club at which you play.

The lack of advanced players who are willing to serve as mentors remains a concern. There will be Sign-up Sheets at the clubs for those who are willing to mentor a less experienced player. We certainly encourage people to sign up as mentors.

The program will be tiered. Less experienced players will be matched up with people with a few more points than they have (or players that are somewhat more skillful). Many bridge players with 200 to 300 masterpoints have great skill and are more than capable of acting as mentors.

We have great faith in our bridge community and are confident that most players will consider becoming a mentor. The requirement is that the pair play a minimum of six games together. In addition, they will establish goals for the mentee and measure progress toward achieving those goals.

We recognize that not all bridge players are ready for participation in the Mentorship Program and we also know that we may not be able to find matches for everyone. However, we promise to do our best to make this program succeed.

We are all looking forward to this year's Mentorship Program.



CALGARY BRIDGE SOCIETY



We are pleased to share some exciting news for our Unit 390 bridge community. Recently, the Calgary Duplicate Bridge Association, a not-for-profit organization incorporated under the Alberta Societies Act, was renamed the Calgary Bridge Society (CBS). The CBS has its own distinct charter and is comprised of an enthusiastic team of volunteers. With dotted-line reporting to the Unit Board, the society's primary mandate is **'to grow the game of bridge in Calgary'**.

The initial goal is to increase the number of active players by 200 - or 50 tables per week. In order to realize this goal, the CBS has identified the following objectives:

- 1. Attract new players and develop, challenge and retain existing players by:
 - ✓ increasing the variety and availability of bridge lessons
 - ✓ offering more special events, both social and competitive
- 2. Establish a members-owned Calgary Bridge Centre to meet the anticipated needs of a growing bridge community by:
 - ✓ exploring the various options for renovating an existing facility or building a new facility
 - ✓ launching a fundraising campaign

Recruiting new duplicate players has been a significant challenge for the Unit. There are numerous players that play in social environments and for various reasons, have chosen not to participate as members of the ACBL. It is our intention to make these players feel welcome and to offer them more choice of venue as well as a wider range of learning and socializing opportunities.

We are making progress. Last month, the Unit gave approval for the CBS to set up a new, members-owned bridge club in Calgary at the Go-Getters Association, located at the West Hillhurst Community Association, 1940 6th Ave NW. Pam Peard, Carol McManus and Doug Mann have taken on the management of the club as President, Secretary and Treasurer, respectively.

Over the next year, Stratified Swiss Team games will be held on Wednesday nights at 7:00 p.m. at a price of \$7.00. If additional time slots become available, the club will offer more games. Once start-up and operating costs have been covered, profits, if any, will be used to promote bridge, expand education programs and improve the enjoyment of the game. Additional funds will be passed on to the CBS to be used in the development of a permanent, members-owned Calgary Bridge Centre.

Under the able chairmanship of Lamya Abougoush, an active fundraising plan is in place to raise money toward renovations of an existing site or the development of a new building. Many of you have already registered for the first fundraising event, the three-session Barbara Seagram workshop weekend September 15-17, 2009. Tickets are \$150 and space is limited. If you haven't registered, we recommend you contact Elaine Stewart (403-246-8691) or Cathy Bird (403-251-4977) as soon as possible to avoid disappointment.

We have total confidence that our community can and should accommodate bridge players at every level, regardless of age, gender or socioeconomic status. For the love of bridge, and the enjoyment of all, let's work together to maximize the potential of our bridge community!

Cards On The Table

Sometimes contracts are simple. The opponent leads and you have nine tricks in 3NT. Other times you have to work hard to generate the extra tricks needed to fulfill the contract. The ability to count cards and to visualize end positions is an indispensable technique for any bridge player who wants to be successful.

Against competent opponents in a late-round Swiss team event, you and partner reach 3NT. Partner has shown a 5-card heart suit with 0-7 HCP and you have shown at least 17 HCP. The lead is the \bigstar 6 and you get the chance to make an initial assessment:

Contract: 3NT Lead: **A**6




Seven easy tricks are available (3 spades, 2 hearts and 2 clubs). The 8^{th} trick might come from a long club, if the suit splits 3-3 or the A drops doubleton. The 9^{th} trick will be routine if the A is onside.

Dummy entries (or should we say "entry") are precious, and the \checkmark K will be needed to cash the long club. You win dummy's \bigstar K perforce and play a low club from dummy, \bigstar 9 from East, \bigstar K, and surprisingly West discards a spade. Plans A (long club) and B (doubleton \bigstar Q) have to be scrapped! Still, East will have to keep three clubs. Maybe if you muck around a bit, something good will occur. South's long diamond might set up for the 9th trick, providing diamonds split 3-3 and the $\bullet A$ is onside. To prepare for this chance, you lead a low diamond from hand towards dummy's 742, $\bullet 8$ from West. East quickly overtakes with the $\bullet 10$ and plays $\bullet A$ and $\bullet Q$ (West discards another spade). Now the cat is out of the bag in that suit too. You win your $\bullet K$ and can see that the rest is going to be easy. The $\bullet J$ will be the 9th trick after all! The $\bullet 9$ will serve as a precious throw-in card to force a club lead from East.

East is known to have 6 clubs and 4 diamonds and has already followed to the initial spade lead. Therefore he can have no more than two hearts. It is time to concede a spade to the AQ (East shows out ... no surprise) and you win the continuation (which must be a major as West has shown out of both minor suits). It's "cards on the table" now ... cash two hearts ending in the South hand (this strips East of exit cards and puts you in the proper hand to throw East in with the fourth diamond). East has no choice but to lead a club around to dummy's A makes nine.

Here is the full layout:



Your approach results in a gain of 12 IMPs on the hand and, more importantly, impresses your team-mates. You tell them it's routine, but you enjoy the glory anyway ©.

How to Win at Bridge

The way to win at bridge is to **Stop Making So Many Mistakes!** Bridge is a game of mistakes. Whoever makes the fewest mistakes wins.

<u>Bidding Mistakes</u>

Bidding is the most important aspect of the game. [Successful bridge players need to be effective declarers, defenders and bidders - Editors].


Unless you consistently reach good contracts you have little chance of winning. Good bidding is not difficult if you avoid some common pitfalls.

Not Supporting Partner at the earliest opportunity is by far the most common bidding mistake and probably the costliest; even experts make this one. Fortunately it is also the easiest to fix.

You hold AKXXX VXXX XXX AXX and partner opens 1, Pass to you. The only correct call now is 2 (unless you play destructive, I mean constructive, raises). The simple raise shows 6-9 points and at least 3 hearts, which is exactly what you have. Do not bid 1, which shows 4 or more spades and 6 or more points and is forcing for one round. Yes you can bid 2, over partner's rebid of 1NT, 2, or 2, but that is merely a simple preference. You will probably survive if partner has 4 spades but if not she will play you for some kind of misfit instead of a minimum hand with heart support. Don't worry! The AKXXX of spades will prove useful in partner's heart contract.

You hold AKJXXX X KX AQXX and open 1A. Partner bids 2A. The proper rebid is 3A not 2A. Your side should have a 5-3 club fit and if partner really has spade support you will hear about it. It's true you have 6 good spades but tell partner you like her club suit or, if you prefer, tell her about 8 cards in your hand instead of 6.

I watched two BBO "stars" who have represented their country internationally perpetrate this auction:



The result was making 5. Opener could not imagine such great Heart support and probably devalued his hand after partner's 1 response. But responder made the key mistake which was not raising to (at least) 2 v instead of making that ridiculous 1 bid. I personally consider the hand good enough for a limit raise.

In a recent ACBL Nationals semi-finals (Spingold or Vanderbilt) 3 of the 4 pairs failed to reach a cold 4 game when responder didn't raise immediately; the 4th responder bid 2 v at once and 4 v was easily bid. This bidding mistake is made all the time, by players of all abilities and experience. Don't let it happen to you!

Let me put it another way. How do you feel about an auction when partner raises your suit? If you are like me, you feel as if you and partner are on the same wavelength - "this auction is off to a good start". You have a reasonable idea of how to proceed even if the opponents compete. You feel hopeful that you will reach the right contract. Life is good! **Support is good news - tell partner the good news as soon as possible**.

Rebidding the Same Values, sometimes more than once, is another common mistake. This one is not so easy to avoid because it often requires, I think, a declaration of weakness – something none of us like to do.

You hold $A \times AKJ109 + K10 \times AQX$ You open 1 \vee , partner raises to 2 \vee , you Pass and then the opponents balance with 2A. Should you bid 3 \vee , 3+, or pass?

Sure you have good Hearts, decent Diamonds, and the *Q which may even be useful since the opponents have bid Spades. Nevertheless you should Pass and let partner make the decision. Partner will bid 3° if he has

4 hearts or some other extra values; he may even be able to Double 2. for penalty. The point is this: you don't know whether partner has 3 hearts and a 5-count or 4 hearts and an 8-count (or 5 spades and a 9-count for that matter), but he will know you have a minimum opener with 5 hearts.

Bidding in this situation shows extra values (at least a 6th heart in this case). If you don't have them, let partner show his extra values.

Don't be a Point Count Slave

Consider these two hands:



The auction went Pass - $1 \Rightarrow$, $1NT - 2 \Rightarrow$, $3 \Rightarrow$ - Pass. Of course you can see that the hand is practically cold for $6 \Rightarrow$ (and declarer made 3 overtricks) but that is how the auction went. Opener's reasoning was this: "I have 16 points, partner has a maximum of 9 points, and we need 28 points for a minor suit game so let's play here".

Opener had much more than the minimum 5 spades, 3 diamonds, and 12 points shown by the bidding and should have taken another bid or rebid 3 • instead of 2 • [Bidding 3 • is not recommended with minimum values, half of which are in the short suits. Opener should have recognized that partner's diamond raise meant there were likely to be few outside losers in a high-level diamond contract - Editors]. Later on I'll introduce some good methods for helping you decide when to try for game; for now I just want to introduce the problem and say that Losing Trick Count (LTC) is a powerful tool in these situations.

Failure to Stop Low on Misfit Hands is another common problem. These "Johnnie Cochran" hands ... "without a fit you must (ac)quit"... are a major source of large minus scores ending in "OO". When you cannot support partner and he refuses to support you, Pass as soon as possible. At your next turn to bid would be a good time. You hold: AX VAKJXXX KQXXX XX

You open 1♥ and partner bids 1♠. You try 2♦ but partner bids 2♠. You should now Pass; do not bid 3♦. Partner has shown a weak hand with lots of Spades. He does not like either of your suits. You have more Spades than you promised. If the opponents Double then Pass again; partner is a big boy and you don't need to rescue him - if he wants to be rescued he will Redouble and you can bid 3 . Yes, he may go for 1100 but its only one hand and at the other table your teammates might collect 1400 against 3 Doubled.

Convention Addiction

There is no doubt that bidding conventions can help you and your partner bid to better contracts but a conventional bid means that the natural meaning of the bid is lost. Is the gain worth the loss?

Consider the decision to use "Constructive Raises" where a simple raise of a major promises 8 or 9 points and at least 3 trumps, just short of a limit raise. It seems like a good idea until you examine what you lose. You lose the ability to raise with 5 to 7 points and support. With these hands you have to bid a forcing 1NT first (or perhaps 1^(A)) and then correct to 2 of opener's major. This is okay if opener has a normal minimum. But if opener has some decent 5-4 he has no idea whether you have 2, 3, 4, or maybe even 5 trumps; the 2-level is high enough with only 2-card support but his hand may be worth at least a game try with real support. It's stressful and causes heart attacks; if you must use constructive raises then figure out some way to show minimum 3 and 4-card raises.

Another common problem with adding a convention to your card is failing to examine all the possibilities. Take "Inverted Minors" for example. What does it mean if you don't use the convention? What happens if the opponents overcall or double? Is it on by a passed hand? What do subsequent bids mean? Is it forcing to game, for one round, maybe only to the 3 or 4-level? All of these questions, and probably more, should be discussed and agreed upon before you and your partner add Inverted Minors to your card.

Always ensure that any new conventions make sense in the context of your complete bidding system. In a later article I will give my recommendations and comments of common conventions.

Your partner is the most important person at the table, be kind to her. If it's no fun why bother?

Focus on Future Masters

How Jake Lost the Event

As the Judge tabled the dummy for the last hand of the tournament he reflected on his partner's penchant for self-destruction at the most inopportune times. Entering the last round his partner, Jake Bridgeman, had confidently predicted a 70% game. JB had considerable flair for the game, but undermined his partnerships with erratic bidding and an intense desire to declare rather than defend.

On the penultimate board JB had opened the bidding with 2. The normal contract of 4. was reached, but, since JB had only a five-card suit, the contract was played from the wrong side. In a sense it was a coup ... JB received a favourable lead and an even friendlier switch which meant an almost certain top board. However, as was his wont, JB was so busy preening that he made an elementary error and lost the contract.

The bidding on the last hand was predictably bizarre. The Judge made a forcing bid of 3 ± 0 over JB's opening of 1NT and JB grabbed control of the auction to place the final contract at 6NT with himself as declarer. This is what JB saw on the lead of the \mathbf{AQ} :




Although the contract is not guaranteed, 12 or 13 tricks seem routine. JB won the A and immediately traveled to his hand with the A to lay the AQ on the table. The finesse lost to the King and RHO returned a diamond to the Jack, Queen and King.


It should have been a mere formality to take the remainder of the tricks. At this juncture Fate intervened. One of the competitors who had already finished whispered to JB that he was leading the event going into the last round.

JB's face flushed with excitement. He led to the \checkmark K and played the \Rightarrow A. LHO played the \Rightarrow 7 and JB followed with the \Rightarrow J. The Judge hoped that this was just another example of flamboyance on JB's part.

JB continued with the A. "You are in the wrong hand" the Judge tried to say, but LHO immediately accepted the lead. When RHO discarded a diamond the contract could no longer be made. The Judge was stunned. JB sheepishly admitted that he got confused and thought he was playing 6A rather than 6NT. The four hands were as follows:



JB's antics had cost 70% of the matchpoints that could have been won on the last two boards. As a result, he and the Judge were nipped at the wire by another pair. Such irony thought the Judge. JB's 70% prediction was accurate, but not in the way he intended. "Even Homer nods", reflected the Judge ruefully.
